This helped the children make meaningful connections between the story and real-life science.

We are excited to keep building on these skills over the next few weeks.




Headteacher's Recommendation




Learning Behaviours




School Uniform and PE Kits



As we continue to promote a sense of belonging and pride within our school community, please ensure your child adheres to our uniform guidelines:

- · Blue sweatshirt or cardigan with school logo
- White polo shirt with collar with school logo
- Long grey trousers or grey skirt/pinafore
- Grey or white socks, or grey tights
- Black school shoes (not trainers or sport shoes)





- **Footwear**: Children must wear sensible black school shoes. Open-toed sandals are not permitted for safety reasons.
- **Hair**: Hairstyles should be simple and not draw undue attention. Hair accessories should be unobtrusive and preferably in school colours.
- **PE Kit:** A pale blue T-shirt (with or without the school logo), royal blue PE shorts, and black pumps are required.

Talk PANTS:

At Blackmoor, we are committed to keeping children safe and helping them develop the confidence to speak up about anything that makes them feel uncomfortable. One of the tools we use is the Talk PANTS campaign, developed by the NSPCC.

Talk PANTS is a simple, age-appropriate way to help children understand that they have a right to feel safe and that their bodies belong to them. It gives them the confidence to say "no" and to speak to a trusted adult if they are ever worried.

We encourage all parents and carers to talk about these messages at home. The NSPCC website has great resources to help make these conversations easier, including videos, games, and even a catchy PANTS song.

As key members of staff in our Early Years/Extended Service provision, Mrs Shepherd and Mrs Crowley are also trained to respond to safeguarding concerns and support our youngest children with care and vigilance.

Holiday Club, Breakfast Club and After-School Club

Please be reminded that access to our Holiday Club, Breakfast Club, and After School Club is dependent on payments being up to date. As outlined in recent correspondence, children will only be able to use these services if there are no outstanding balances on your account.

If you currently have an outstanding balance, unfortunately, you will not be able to access these services until payment has been received.

Please speak to the school office at your earliest convenience to bring your account up to date. We appreciate your cooperation and continued support in helping us manage these services effectively.

Sun Safety at Blackmoor Park Infant School

As we are due to experience continued warm weather over the coming days, we would like to remind you of the importance of sun safety during the school day.

Please ensure that your child is protected by applying a long-lasting, all-day sun cream before they arrive at school, as staff are not able to apply sun cream during the day.

We also recommend that children bring a labelled, suitable sun hat and a refillable water bottle to help them stay cool and well-hydrated whilst outdoors.



Use of Mobile Phones

We kindly remind all parents and visitors that mobile phone use is not permitted inside the school building. This policy is in place for important safeguarding reasons, to help ensure the safety, privacy, and wellbeing of all our children.

We ask that phones be kept out of sight and not used while on the school premises. If you need to make or take a call, please do so once you have exited the building.

Thank you for your understanding and support in helping us maintain a safe and secure environment for all.



Early Collection and Holiday Requests

I would like to take a moment to kindly remind families about the importance of consistent attendance and punctuality.

I have noticed that a number of children are being collected early from school on a regular basis. Whilst I completely understand that early collection may occasionally be necessary for medical appointments or in genuine emergencies, I do ask that this is kept to a minimum.

Early collection can be disruptive for the child and the class, and they result in missed learning time that quickly adds up.

I would also like to address the number of holiday requests I have received for term-time leave. Whilst I absolutely recognise the challenges families face — particularly the sharp rise in holiday prices — I must be clear that I am not able to authorise holidays during term time. Our policy explains that any requests should be put in writing, but schools are not permitted to approve holiday absences unless there are **exceptional** circumstances.

As someone who enjoys holidays myself, I do sympathise, but I appreciate your support in making sure children are in school as much as possible.

Transition - July 2025

I would like to reassure parents and carers that discussions are currently taking place regarding transition arrangements for September 2025. I understand that transition is just as important for parents and carers as it is for the children, and I am committed to ensuring the process is smooth and well-communicated.

With this in mind, I will confirm new class teachers and support staff before the May half term. This will allow ample time for staff to begin visiting their new classes and start building relationships ahead of the new academic year in September.

Further details will be shared in due course.

Miss Wilkins has made contact with Blackmoor Park Junior School to discuss transition from Year 2 to Year 3. There is no need to apply for a place, this is automatically done as they leave the infants.
