
Headteacher's Recommendation

Effective Communication

To ensure that any concerns are addressed promptly and appropriately, I kindly remind parents and carers of the following escalation process:

- 1. Class Teacher If you have a question, concern, or issue, your first point of contact should always be your child's class teacher. They are best placed to help with day-to-day matters.
- 1. **Assistant Headteachers** If you feel the issue has not been resolved after speaking with the class teacher, the next step is to contact the appropriate Assistant Headteacher:
 - Mrs Rattigan For matters relating to Early Years
 - Miss Wilkins For matters relating to Year 1 and Year 2
- 1. **Headteacher** If, after following the above steps, you still feel that your concern has not been adequately addressed, you may then escalate the matter to me (Mr Naylor).

Following this channel of communication not only ensures that your concerns are dealt with in the most effective way but also models respectful and constructive problem-solving for our children.

Minecraft:

As Minecraft remains a popular game among children, I would like to remind parents and carers about the useful guide we have shared (see the attached image). Created by National Online Safety, it highlights key points to help keep children safe while playing.

Important advice includes:

- Understanding the risks of public servers and online chats with strangers.
- Being aware of in-game purchases and how gameplay can become addictive.
- Encouraging regular screen breaks and ageappropriate content.
- Choosing safer game modes such as 'Creative' or 'Peaceful' for younger players.

With the right support, Minecraft can be a creative, educational and enjoyable experience. We encourage all families to read the guide and have a chat with their child about staying safe online.
